PATROL OPERATIONS

The Patrol Operations Division is under the command of *Captain Daniel Ontiveros*. He is assisted by two Lieutenants and four Sergeants. Patrol Operations is the main function and workhorse of Belton PD.

Patrol responds to calls for police service, conducts preventive patrol, enforces traffic laws, conducts preliminary investigations into criminal activity, arrests criminal offenders, and seeks proactive interactions with citizens and groups.

Patrol is divided into two teams, Red and White, which are made up of two 12-hour shifts each. Patrol is normally the first point of contact the public has with the police department. In 2024, officers responded to approximately **34,964** calls for service.



SPECIAL OPERATIONS

The Special Operations Division is under the command of *Captain Richard Spurgeon*. He is assisted by a Lieutenant, Communications Manager, and Sergeant. This division is comprised of services that support the delivery of law enforcement response to citizens of Belton including:



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

The School Resource Officer (SRO) Unit is a partnership between BPD and Belton Independent School District (BISD). Five BPD Officers are assigned to 11 BISD campuses in the City of Belton. This collaboration is funded both by BISD and the City of Belton. The goal of the SRO program is to promote a safe learning environment and deter school distractions that jeopardize safety. This accomplished by proactive interaction with faculty and students, quick responses to disruptions, investigation of activity on campuses, and presentations criminal prevention programs. SROs gave an oath to protect students at the beginning of the semester.



CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

The Criminal Investigations Division is staffed with five Detectives, a Crime Scene Technician, Crime Victim Liaison, and one Lieutenant. Detectives are responsible for solving crimes through follow-up investigations of criminal offenses that occur in the City of Belton. The Detectives also represent Belton in multi-jurisdictional partnerships.

CODE COMPLIANCE

The Code Compliance Unit handles animal calls and code enforcement for the City of Belton. Two fulltime staff members, who are cross-trained in these specialties, form the unit.





VICTIM SERVICES



- Take Me Home Program started in July.
- Inspired to adopt this program in March 2024 after Rogelio Arias, an elderly man who wandered away from home and was found deceased in a remote area two weeks later.
- Database created for law enforcement to quickly access information on people who are missing and need help getting home.
- Designed for individuals who may need special assistance, including those with dementia, autism, or specific mental health needs.
- 18 Take Me Home participants registered.
- Partnership with the Dementia Enrichment Center and BISD Delta Program.

- Belton PD has served 622 victims in 2024, with over 2,400 contacts made by Victim Services.
- Top three crimes for victims served (1. Domestic Violence: 91, 2. Identity Theft/Fraud/Financial Crime: 86, 3. Adult Physical Assault: 84)
- Partnerships with Helping Hands to help provide food and clothes.
- New resource this year, 911 Phone Bank provides free cell phones for victims of crime in need.
- 7 new Victim Services volunteers in 2024, totaling 254 hours calling and assisting victims.



- In honor of Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October, officers, detectives, staff, and Victim Services volunteers place 149 purple flags in front of Belton PD.
- Each flag symbolizes one of the 149 victims affected by domestic violence in Belton this year.
- Since the start of 2024, there have been 642 calls made to 911 in Belton reporting various acts of domestic violence.
- Of those calls, 149 calls involved physical or verbal abuse, weapons, or injuries.

CHIPS, RU OK?, & BELTON POLICE FOUNDATION



The Citizens Helping in Police Services (CHIPS) Program was formed in 2011 to expand police resources through the use of volunteers. A benefit of the program is that it deters crime through visible presence. CHIPS supplement department resources by being extra eyes and ears while patrolling parks, shopping centers, and other areas where large groups gather. Belton Police Department volunteers collectively served more than 3,500 hours in 2024. Additionally, over 100 victims were contacted and served by volunteers. Currently, 67 volunteers are part of our CHIPS Program.

CHIPS members are graduates of the Citizen's Police Academy (CPA) Program. Graduates of CPA formed a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization, the Belton Police Foundation, committed to supporting BPD initiatives and staff. The Belton Police Foundation funds essential equipment and programs for the Belton Police Department which are not included in the City budget.

CHIPS members staff the phones for the highly successful "RU OK? Program," which works to ensure safety and provide help to the elderly of Belton. The "RU OK? Program" is credited with saving 17 lives to date. The Silver Santa initiative brings Christmas joy to all of the "RU OK?" participants by providing wrapped gifts to each of them. Silver Santa bags were delivered to 93 participants in 2024.





A Law Enforcement Explorer Post was established in Belton in 2012. The program is intended for youth (age 14-20) who have expressed an interest in the criminal justice field as a career. Our commitment is to improve relations between the Belton Police Department and the youth in Belton. Explorers learn police work through specialized training and community service. The program allows young people to serve the community, develop leadership skills, and provides support from peers and adults during the maturing process. BPD Explorers can be seen working alongside officers at parades, community events, and Belton Tiger football games. New this year, the program expanded to Law Enforcement Explorers additionally receiving Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training during the summer camp. Following the spring storm, program leaders thought this certification would be a beneficial skillset for the Explorers to learn, and support the community in the process with additional CERT members ready to assist.

Belton School Resource Officers have held **12 Youth Police Camps** for middle school students. The goal of Youth Camp is to build rapport between police officers and youth in our community.





CLERGY-POLICE PARTNERSHIP



The Belton Clergy-Police Partnership (BCPP) is a team of local pastors serving as a liaison between the police department and the community. BCPP members minister to officers and victims of crime; pray for the police department and the community; communicate community concerns directly to the Chief of Police; and provide calm during a crisis. The BPD Police Chaplain, Alton McCallum, leads the BCPP team.

ACCREDITED TEXAS AGENCY

The Belton Police Department became the first Bell County law enforcement agency to be recognized as an Accredited Law Enforcement Agency by the Texas Police Chiefs Association Law Enforcement Agency Best Practices Accreditation Program. The accreditation program evaluates compliance with 170 Texas best practice standards. These standards were developed by Texas law enforcement professionals to assist agencies to efficiently and effectively serve the public and protect individual rights. They cover all aspects of law enforcement operations including use of force, protection of citizen rights, vehicle pursuits, property and evidence management, and patrol and investigative operations. BPD was awarded re-accreditation status in 2014, 2018, and 2022 putting it among the elite 7% of Texas law enforcement agencies.









The Citizen's Police Academy is an exciting and unique opportunity for people who live or work in Belton to get to know their Police Department. This annual academy is held once a week for nine weeks and gives the participants in depth experiences in all aspects of policing. Each week focuses on a new topic, which include:

- · Patrol Operations and ride-alongs with Officers
- Use of Force with hands on demonstrations
- Criminal Investigations
- School Resource Officers
- · Dispatch and jail tours
- Traffic stops and crash investigations
- Role playing experiences
- SWAT
- · Building searches

Class 15 of CPA was held in 2024 and Class 16 began enrolling new members in December.
